CONSERVING THE REGION'S RAREST PLANTS

Home to a wide range of rare plant species, Otay Mountain in San Diego County is a unique place of focus for the Garden's conservation efforts. As part of a collaboration with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), in 2022 our Science & Conservation team began intensively surveying, mapping, collecting, and propagating 10 of the most rare and endangered species found on the land, including *Lepechinia ganderi* (Gander's pitcher sage) featured above. Combining conservation efforts with educational programming, this project will continue into 2023, providing a vital conservation resource for preserving San Diego's biodiversity in an important open space area.




SCIENCE, CONSERVATION, & COLLECTIONS

Science and conservation continue to be key pillars of focus at the Garden and further afield as we work to address our biggest local and global challenges, from biodiversity loss to climate change, food insecurity to environmental degradation. With a focus on protecting California native plants, medicinal plants, and food and agricultural plants, in 2022 the Science and Conservation team took part in a number of major projects with regional and global impacts. Project highlights include:

- The creation of a national medicinal plants collection and research consortium to catalyze natural drug discovery in San Diego and beyond.
- · Baseline data collection and metrics to inform global strategies for the conservation and use of plant genetic resources for food and agriculture.
- · Surveying, conserving and propagating of rare and special plants only found in the US-Mexico borderlands around Otay Mountain Wilderness.

These projects are innovative in the ways they merge efforts that are conventionally done in isolation - conservation combined with education, habitat protection with horticulture, and wild plant botany with food security. They are similarly exciting in the ways they bring together local, state, and national agencies and governments, community and nonprofit organizations, academic institutions, and industry partners to work for people and for the planet.



MEDICINAL PLANTS

In 2022, efforts for the medicinal plants program at the Garden began advancing thanks to support from The Prebys Conrad Foundation and Garden donors. This included building a dedicated team of experts from Education, Horticulture, and Science and Conservation departments, mapping out medicinal plants in the gardenscape for new educational programming, and constructing a 2,100 square foot greenhouse dedicated to the medicinal plant collection. The team formed a research consortium with 15 institutional partners in San Diego and worked closely with Salk Institute for Biological Studies to conduct preliminary genomic and metabolomic analysis of select native medicinal plants.

EDUCATION

With a vision of offering unique educational opportunities that inspire curiosity, exploration, and a connection to nature, the SDBG Education Department significantly expanded not only the number of classes and programs offered, but also the number of youth and adult participants throughout the year. Onsite offerings like SAPLinGS (Science, Art, and PLay in Garden Spaces) drew more than 15,000 children in just the second year of the program, while offsite projects like the Ocean Knoll Canyon Oak Restoration invited 300 elementary school students to learn about habitat restoration with our staff. Important partnerships with local nonprofits and schools through programs like Budburst, a community science project and app, along with Access Afternoons, allowed us to welcome hundreds of visitors from underserved communities and ensure our Garden is an inclusive place of beauty that is accessible to all.

ACCESS AFTERNOONS

In March 2022, SDBG launched Access Afternoons, a community outreach program offering free, regularly-scheduled Garden visits to underserved communities, including economically disadvantaged families, students and seniors. In partnership with Alzheimer's San Diego, Boys and Girls Club of San Dieguito, Community Resource Center, Senior Center of Encinitas, and USO (San Diego & Camp Pendleton), SDBG welcomed 545 participants from this program for interactive tours and hands-on workshops customized to meet the needs and interests of each group.
